## West Lothian's buzzing 🦚



There's a buzz in the air in 2018 as West Lothian takes urban wildflower meadows to the next level.

After trialling some small areas in a few parks, the council will be working with the UK charity Buglife to trial some larger wildflower meadows, aiming to create over 5 hectares of new meadows in District Parks across West Lothian.

Buglife has completed many successful major wildflower meadow projects elsewhere.

West Lothian Council's Open Space Officer Becky Plunkett explains: "The parks we will be working in are: Balbardie Park in Bathgate,

Stewartfield Park in Broxburn and Bankton Mains, Almond, Howden and Eliburn Parks in Livingston. We will also trial some areas along the Killandean Burn in Livingston.

"There are different ways to create wildflower meadows, therefore, in some parks we'll prepare the ground and scatter seed; in other areas we'll reduce mowing to once a year, in order to allow the existing plants to bloom and set seed.

"In both cases, the meadows will be cut in autumn and the cuttings will

be removed. This helps to reduce the fertility of the soil and enables a greater variety of wildflowers to flourish. In some areas we may also plant Yellow Rattle, which feeds on grass and weakens it, also helping wildflowers to thrive."

### Why are West Lothian **Council doing this?**


Over 97% of species-rich grassland has been lost in the UK in the last 100 years. This has led to a significant decline in pollinating insects that provide us with free pollinating

services worth millions of pounds to the UK economy.

Over 250 species of pollinator in the UK are threatened with extinction. West Lothian Council is looking to change the management of some grasslands to support pollinators, to prevent further habitat loss and to boost our resilience to Climate Change.

If successful, we will roll out this approach to other parks and open spaces, as appropriate.

We anticipate that by developing



more innovative ways of managing our parks such as this, we will increase biodiversity, reduce the overall amount of seasonal cutting, and reduce the energy and chemicals expended on maintenance, which will also save costs in the long term.



## Welcome to Linlithgow Partnership Centre

The new centre, which is called Linlithgow Partnership Centre - Tam Dalyell House - has brought a number of local services under one roof and has breathed new life into one of the town's most prominent and historic buildings.

West Lothian Council has invested over £4million to refurbish the County Buildings in the town's High Street. The building originally opened in 1940 and served as the offices of the West Lothian County Council.

A number of facilities will be relocated in the completed building including; Linlithgow Library, Customer Information Services, Local History Library, Family History Society, Linlithgow Heritage Trust (formally known as Annet House) and Linlithgow & District Community Day Care Centre. There will also be accommodation for Police Scotland who has relocated from the nearby police station and a number of council staff.

The council named the Partnership Centre after the late Tam Dalvell MP to mark his unique contribution to West Lothian life and his long record of outstanding service to West Lothian's people and communities. A portrait of Tam Dalyell is displayed in the lobby of the new Centre. Mr Dalvell served as a member of Parliament for the local area from 1962 to 2005 and passed

away in January 2017. Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick joined Mrs

Kathleen Dalyell, Tam Dalyell's widow, and family members to officially open the new centre earlier this year.

Councillor Fitzpatrick said: "The development of a Partnership Centre in Linlithgow has been a key aim for West Lothian Council for a long time and we're delighted to be joined by Mrs Dalyell to officially open this fantastic new facility.

"This multi-million pound investment has transformed the building and will provide local people with first class community facilities in the heart of the town centre. The investment will safeguard the future of this important building for generations to come.

"The refurbishment and improvement

works have ensured the building is multi-functional, modern and fit for purpose."

Executive councillor for culture and leisure, Dave King, said: "The council has a strong track record of creating centres that deliver positive benefits for the communities in which they are based. Our Partnership Centre model is now being replicated across Scotland.

"The Linlithgow Partnership Centre is unique in that we have taken a much loved and historic building and redeveloped it, rather than build it from scratch.

"We have put a huge amount of effort into retaining the historic characteristics of the building. The finished facility is first class and it is a building that local people can be proud of."

The new Library, Customer Information Services and Local History Library are all now open to the public. The Family History Society, Linlithgow & District Community Day Care Centre will move into the new centre over the coming months, including The Linlithgow Heritage Trust and Police Scotland's Linlithgow station.

A total of 23 boys were named Jacob in West Lothian during 2017, making it the most popular name for boys, with Emily and Olivia joint first choice for girls with 19 babies each.

Sophie was the third most popular name for a girl locally in 2017, with Hannah and Jessica in joint fourth place. Lewis was the second most popular names for boys born in West Lothian in 2017, followed by Adam, Alexander, James and Oliver in joint third place.

The top ten names in West Lothian were completed by Harry, Charlie and Harris for boys and Harper, Amelia, Aria, Ella, Emma, Freya and Lily for girls.

A West Lothian Council spokesperson said: "The most popular choice by West Lothian parents for boys was Jacob, which differs substantially from the national charts where it was only

the 13th most popular choice for boys across Scotland.

"Jacob did not make the top ten list for West Lothian in 2016, and has seen a substantial rise on popularity for boys locally, along with Adam and James in 2017. Jack continues to be the most popular name for boys nationally.

"Olivia and Emily were also the most picked girls' names in Scotland, with Olivia rising in popularity in West Lothian from 7th place in 2016 to joint first in 2017. Both Hannah and Harper also saw marked increases in popularity in West Lothian in 2017, but did not make the national top ten lists.

"A number of most popular baby names in West Lothian for 2016 have dropped out of the top ten in 2017, including Finlay, Noah and Lucas for boys, and Ellie, Ava and Charlotte for girls.'

The new Whitehill Service Centre in Bathgate will be home to around 800 council staff from seven key West Lothian Council services and will replace a number of existing council properties.

Staff from Operational Services, which includes Waste Services, Neighbourhood Environmental Teams, Roads and Transportation, Fleet Services and Community Transport Services have moved into the building.

The construction of the new Service Centre follows the council's strategic policy of disposing of existing properties which are expensive to

maintain and run, and replacing them with a modern, fit for purpose facility which will centralise a number of key services under one roof.

In addition to a reduction in property and maintenance costs, the Service Centre will present the opportunity for greater collaborative working between services and a more modern environment in which to deliver efficient services for the public.

This forward-thinking model of bringing together services to deliver both savings and efficiencies is already successfully used in West

Lothian at the Civic Centre, Kirkton Service Centre and partnership centres across West Lothian. Executive Councillor for the

environment Tom Conn, said: "It is great to see staff moving into the new Whitehill Service Centre at Whitehill Industrial Estate. The council is modernising the way services are organised and delivered in order to provide the best value for Council Tax payers.

"Co-locating services is a fantastic way to create savings and allow the council to work smarter through modern energy-efficient buildings and better working practices.

## Tackling period poverty

Steps are being taken to tackle period poverty in West Lothian.

The council is also working closely with social enterprises such as West Lothian Food Bank and Hey Girls to ensure vulnerable women in West Lothian have access to free feminine hygiene products when they need them.

Depute Leader of the Council Kirsteen Sullivan said: "We strongly believe that sanitary products are not a

luxury, and finances should not prevent women getting essentials such as these. Research shows that many women living in poverty are struggling to pay for basic necessities, and the £18,000 of short-term funding will help a number of those in greatest need. We will continue to look at ways of improving access to sanitary products for those in need where

West Lothian Council is working with the Hey Girls organisation on an ongoing pilot scheme to supply sanitary products to West Lothian's 11 secondary schools. Stocks are also available in primary and additional support needs schools. A national programme of free feminine hygiene products for those in need is expected to be launched later in the year.

## Changes to the Blue Badge Scheme

The council is introducing a £20 charge for blue badges issued from the 1 April 2018. This will be applied to successful blue badge applications and for lost, stolen or confiscated badges.



The income collected from the charge will be used to fund administration of blue badges and brings the council in line with the majority of Scottish

authorities. Current blue badge holders are required to reapply when it expires and this will continue to be treated as a new application. Successful

applicants will be given more information on how to pay for their blue badge when their application has been

Executive councillor for culture and leisure, Dave King said: "This is a fantastic accolade for West Calder Library and is a testament


to the hard work of those involved in this project. The library has an important place in the local community due to its proud history and the restoration work has ensured the building will continue to be at the heart of the town for years to come."

West Calder Library was originally opened by Lord Roseberry in 1904 and was funded by a grant from Andrew Carnegie. The current refurbishment was designed in-house by West Lothian Council Construction Services (Architects), with Currie & Brown, WYG and Brown + Wallace as the design team, and was delivered on-site by Clark Contracts.

The project allowed the building to be sympathetically restored and keep most of its original grade B listed features including

The space beneath the library, formally the Librarians house, has also been converted to provide modern semi-open plan offices for Breich Valley Housing Team.

The current Library provides adult reading groups, Bookbug sessions for families, children's activities and books for all ages. Computers are available for free public use with sessions bookable in one hour slots.



# Council budget agreed

## Your guide to West Lothian Council's budget

West Lothian Council has agreed its revenue budget for 2018/19 and a long-term financial plan that will deliver local services. The plan will begin to bridge an estimated £65 million budget gap over the next five years.



The council will invest over £408 million to deliver local services in 2018/19.

The budget will focus on priority areas such as West Lothian's schools, social care and services for the vulnerable.

Council Tax - which provides 19% of the council's funding - has been increased for the first time in over ten years.

Council Tax will increase by 3% across all bands in 2018/19 and a 3% increase is planned for each of the next four years between 2019/20 and 2022/23. 70% of respondents who took part in the Transforming Your Council consultation agreed with the proposal to raise Council Tax by 3% in each of the next five years.

Speaking after the council budget meeting, Leader of West Lothian Council, Councillor Lawrence Fitzpatrick said:

"Next year the council will invest a further £408 million in West Lothian's public services. Prioritising key areas such as schools, roads, social care and care for vulnerable people. The council's aim is to continue to build upon our successes to date with £154 million being invested in education next year, over £105 million on social services, and around £56 million on maintaining West Lothian's roads, paths, open spaces, waste services, community facilities and infrastructure."


# Why the council must make changes and reduce services in some areas

Why does the council have a £65 million budget gap?

The estimated budget gap of £65 million is based on the assumption that Scottish Government grant funding is not enough to meet the increasing costs of providing existing council services

West Lothian has a growing population which increases the costs of providing council services such as schools and care for older people. Funding from the Scottish Government is not enough to pay for these increased costs as well as other existing services.

The Scottish Government – who provide the council with 80% of its funding – has given the council a real terms decrease in core funding of £7.5 million for 2018/19. However, West Lothian's population is expected to increase by 10,000 over the next five years, increasing demand for council services. This, combined with rising costs for services, means that the council's budget gap now totals nearly £14 million for 2018/19, £65 million over five years 2018/19 to 2022/23.



## How will the council balance its budget and bridge a budget gap of £65 million over the next five years?

To enable the council to balance its budget, a number of changes to existing services are necessary and have been approved by the council.

## Income and contributions:

West Lothian Council has one of the lowest levels of income through sales, fees and charges per head of population in Scotland, compared to other Scottish councils.

To raise income, which will then be used to protect services, the council is introducing charges for the following:

 A charge of £25 for bulky uplifts (85% of Scottish local authorities charge for bulky uplifts. The remaining councils provides one free uplift and levy a charge thereafter. West Lothian

- Council is currently the only local authority to provide three free uplifts)
- A charge for developers for new waste collections bins
- A £20 administrative charge for the issuing of new blue badges to bring West Lothian into line with every other council in Scotland (all other Scottish Local Authorities currently charge for this service. All bar one charge the maximum of £20 set out in Scottish Government legislation).
- Charging for some council owned car parks (the majority of other councils in Scotland charge for some car parks within their authority.
   Blue badge holders will be able to continue to park for free)
- Increase in community alarms and Telecare charges. This will bring West

Lothian into line with other Scottish councils

Introduction of a social care contributions policy where all non-residential care clients would be financially assessed to calculate the maximum contribution they might be expected to make to their care. The financial assessment will also include a benefits check for income maximisation to ensure that clients are receiving all the benefits that they are entitled to. Officers will develop proposal for the introduction of a contributions policy for non-residential care services. Introducing a contributions policy will bring West Lothian into line with the vast majority of other Scottish councils.

### Budget reduction measures over the next five years include:

Overall, the council anticipates that staffing numbers will reduce by around 134 Full-Time Equivelant (FTE) staff members which equates to 2% of the council's total workforce.

Despite the council making significant changes to working practices and staffing numbers, regrettably further changes are necessary to balance a budget gap of £65 million over the next five years. These include:

- Closure of Livingston and Whitdale Family Centres, with support for the most vulnerable families continuing on an outreach basis in local communities.
- Closure of Limecroft and Whitdale House Day Care for older people. The day care centres within Limecroft Care Home and Whitdale Care Home will be closed, with day care for eligible older people provided exclusively through the existing externally commissioned service.
- Removal of funding for Police Scotland.
- Removal of the taxi card scheme.
   All customers can still access taxi services however, there will be no subsidy.
- Reduced opening hours at Armadale, Whitburn, Blackburn and Broxburn CIS (the council will aim to alter opening hours in line with customer demand. CIS offices in Livingston and Bathgate will continue to operate from 8.30am to 5pm).
- Promoting the Community Asset Transfer of some community centres, village halls and sport pavilions.
- Reduced cleaning levels in council buildings.
- A review of winter service provision.
- Reductions in the overall funding to the voluntary sector to help ensure wider involvement in local decision making.
- Changing the eligibility threshold for non-residential care services to substantial and critical for all new service users and existing service users at the point of review. Eligibility is determined through an assessment of needs which takes account of a person's informal networks and available community supports before a decision is made about whether formal care and support is required to maintain independence.

### Council Tax

Council Tax - which provides 19% of the council's funding - has been increased for the first time in over ten years. Council Tax will increase by 3% across all bands in 2018/19 and a 3% increase is planned for each of the following four years between 2019/20 to 2022/23.\* (see note at bottom of page). **If Council Tax was not increased by 3% per annum this would increase the budget gap by £16.9 million.**

The plan is closely linked to the council's budget to ensure that investment on services meets the needs of local communities. It sets out the eight priorities that we believe will help our community to grow and succeed and, as a result, will be a focus for council resources in the years ahead as we strive to deliver positive change in each one.

For over 20 years, the council has been working with and for our

local community, delivering and improving the quality of public services in West Lothian. In the last five years, the council has achieved significant progress in making West Lothian a smarter, healthier, wealthier, fairer and greener place to live. This includes achieving the best ever exam results, building more new council housing than any other authority in Scotland and maintaining high performance

in housing, environmental and regulatory services, social work and across many other council services.

Our success so far has been built on strong engagement with our community to understand their needs.

In developing our five-year Corporate Plan with effective corporate and financial planning, we aim to set clear goals that unite our services, partners and community.


## Developing our Corporate Plan

A number of factors have influenced the council's planning processes for 2018/23 and the development of the Corporate Plan.

### **About West Lothian**

In setting eight priorities for West Lothian and the Corporate Plan, the council has taken account of some important information about the local population in order to ensure that we have a plan that will meet local needs.

West Lothian, unlike most other areas in Scotland, has a growing population. Critically it has growth in two key demographics that require services from the council, younger people and older people. By 2023, it is estimated that:

# Our Priorities for 2018/23

The council has eight priorities for the period 2018/19 to 2022/23. These reflect the areas that are the most important for the community and improving the quality of life for all living, working and visiting West Lothian.

In the next five years, the council will focus on achieving positive outcomes in each priority.



### Measuring success in each priority

The council has robust performance management arrangements that provide an in-depth view of the quality, efficiency and effectiveness of our service delivery and our impact on the community.

A performance scorecard, with measures of success and targets for each priority, will provide information on the council's performance throughout the lifetime of the Corporate Plan. This information will be used across the next five years to challenge and scrutinise performance in each priority and to provide transparent reporting of performance to the public.

## £390 million invested in council assets

An ambitious programme to invest almost £390 million in West Lothian's assets over the next ten years has been approved.

This includes over £265.8 million to be invested in maintaining and improving West Lothian's property assets, such as £200 million for schools and £6 million for new partnership centres, which will reduce running costs by rationalising buildings.

Other investment includes: £72 million of planned spend on our roads, footpaths and related assets; £33.2 million for vital information and communication technology (ICT) assets; and £17.6 million invested on maintaining and improving open spaces

such as sports facilities, play parks and woodlands.

A total of £18.5 million is also being invested in Additional Support Needs (ASN) schools, including £6 million for a new Cedarbank School, which will increase specialist provision and support the projected growth in pupils with ASN.

A £1 million Community Property Modernisation fund will also be created to help support and empower communities looking to take responsibility for local facilities

West Lothian's road and footpath network is one of the best in Scotland, and £26.5 million has been allocated over the next ten years to make sure this is maintained. A further £26.5 million will be invested to replace street lighting and traffic signals, £13.9 million to maintain our bridges and £5 million for flood prevention, including projects at Liggat Syke in Broxburn.

Technology plays a major role in efficient delivery of customer-focused council services and £33.2 million will be invested to modernise council assets in this area, such as IT devices and software, connectivity and infrastructure including storage, servers, wireless and security.

Open Space investment will see £12.9 of proposed spending planned improvements to sports facilities and functional open spaces, and £2.6 million to replace and renew the equipment in council play areas across West

The £200 million investment in education infrastructure is planned in the next ten years will help meet the rising demands in this area.

Planned major projects include: £50 million for

Planned major projects include: £50 million for two new secondary schools for Winchburgh, new primary schools in Broxburn, Bangour, Calderwood and Gavieside; £15.4million to expand nursery places to meet demand; as well as a number of school extensions.



## Improving and growing council housing

West Lothian Council will spend over £154 million over the next five years improving and increasing its council housing stock.

Over £79 million from the budget will be spent on increasing the housing supply over the course of the next five years.

This includes the completion of the current new build programme of 1000 houses in addition to a commitment to construct a further 250 new council homes.

A further 90 Open Market Acquisitions will be incorporated into the programme, as the council continues to look at expanding the housing supply and achieve a target of delivering 3000 new houses during the period 2012-2022.

West Lothian Council is one of Scotland's top councils in terms of building new council homes, which aims to help tackle the high demand for affordable housing in West Lothian. The new build project will bring a number of benefits to the community such as training and employment opportunities for apprentices, local people and businesses.

The capital programme for housing will also invest over £75 million to improve the existing stock. Projects will include investment in energy efficiency measures and replacement of central heating systems to help reduce fuel poverty. These works are part of planned maintenance programmes that also includes electrical testing and repairs along with painting fencing work.

Planned work will continue on environmental programmes and external upgrading projects, including tenant led street improvements projects.

A rent increase of 3% per annum for council homes and garages has also been approved by West Lothian Council. This follows on from a recent consultation with tenants which indicated that the majority of responses from tenants supported a 3% rent increase per annum.

### Executive councillor for services for the community, George Paul, said:

"A significant amount of investment is going towards the completion of 1,000 new council homes across all ward areas as part of our existing, new build programme with a new commitment to deliver a further 250 homes in the years ahead."

## **Glowing reports** for West Lothian schools





It was double delight for West Lothian schools with Pumpherston and Uphall Station Community Primary and Ogilivie School Campus receiving excellent reports from Education Scotland.

Pumpherston and Uphall Station Community Primary School has been praised for its positive relationships between children and staff. Inspectors highlighted a number of key strengths including: the high quality, inclusive ethos which permeates the school, resulting in children, staff and stakeholders feeling valued and respected: the quality of the learning experiences in the nursery; and the leadership of the

headteacher in creating the conditions for staff to build on their strengths and take forward the agenda for school improvement.

Ogilvie School Campus, which specializes in education for school for primary pupils with social, emotional and behavioral needs, received praise in a number of areas following a recent routine inspection by Education Scotland. Inspectors noted: a strong sense of community across the

school led by the energetic, open leadership style of the acting headteacher; positive relationships between children and staff leading to children feeling safe and cared for, ably supported by advanced pupil support workers; teachers provide learning experiences which are engaging and motivating for children; and strong partnerships with parents and other stakeholders.

Executive councillor for education, David Dodds, said: "These are fantastic reports for both Pumpherston and **Uphall Station Community** Primary and Ogilvie School Campus. Everyone involved with the schools should take great pride in their work. I'd like to thank all members of staff, parents, partners and the wider school community for the part that they have played to help achieve a positive learning environment for our fantastic pupils."

## Work completed at Mid Calder Nursery

Work has been completed on a brand new, £1 million, energy efficient nursery at Mid Calder Primary School.

The new nursery was designed with children's learning and play at the forefront, with the old nursery building being demolished to make way for the improvements. Further work on the project included a new nursery playground and pedestrian accessway to the school.

Mid Calder Head Teacher Mary McKenzie added: "The new facility is free-flowing giving the pupils greater access to choosing whether they want to be indoors or outdoors which is already making a positive difference to the children's learning."



## LET YOUR OLD GARDEN TOOLS

Do you have any old or broken garden hand tools lurking in your shed? Why not give them a new lease of life by donating them to community groups and schools in West Lothian via the Tool Shed project.

Tool Shed is a garden tools recycling project run by the Conservation Foundation in partnership with HMP Edinburgh and West Lothian Council.

Prisoners help to repair the tools while learning transferable skills which are vital to the reduction of re-offending. The free tools are given a new lease of life and go to valuable projects in the region, building better environments for communities.

Last year, 1593 tools including forks, spades, shovels, rakes, hoes and shears were collected at West Lothian Council recycling centres. The vast majority were repaired and given away to community groups. The scheme helps radically reduce landfill waste and saves local schools and community groups money while providing them with useful tools.

The tools are put to good use across West Lothian in projects such as, school gardening clubs like Dechmont Infant School where the tools are used in an eco-garden and Murieston Environmental Group where the tools where used to restore Cambridge pond and woodland. By giving away your broken and unwanted garden hand tools you are helping to rehabilitate prisoners and provide

## **Torphichen Primary** continues to grow

Torphichen Primary School continues to grow as pupils planted the first seeds in their brand new apple orchard.

With the Hadden Group nearing the completion of the £1 million improvement programme at the school, work took place to enhance the outdoor learning environment by planting an apple orchard.

As part of their Community Benefit partnership, Hadden Group worked alongside pupils and their families to plant six different species of apple trees to create an orchard which would provide a lasting memory for them.

The orchard was chosen as the Community Benefit project by Torphichen Primary School

and their Parent Teacher Association committee. The orchard will provide a wealth of opportunities for the pupils to develop their Science and outdoor learning in relation to life cycles, inherited and non-inherited characteristics, classification, fertilisation, pollination and nutrition.

The construction project works consist of a new two classroom extension, a new integrated kitchen and dining facilities and new pupil toilets, which are key parts of the plan to help the school manage the expected rise in pupil numbers and support the Curriculum for Excellence.



# WEST LOTHIAN COUNCIL **HOUSING UPDATES**



West Lothian Council is currently building 1,000 new homes across all nine council ward areas as part of a £115 million investment in housing, making the local authority one of Scotland's largest providers of new build council properties.

## **LIVINGSTON FOOTBALL STADIUM**

Work is now underway to develop new council homes in Almondvale, Livingston.

The stadium project will be split over two sites - one to the north of Lidl and one to the south. Across both sites 37 affordable homes will be built.

The new housing will consist of a mixture of cottage flats, terraced, semi-detached and detached

houses as well as wheelchair accessible bungalows. Lovell Partnership began building on behalf of West Lothian Council earlier this year, with the first homes expected to be completed in May 2018 and all the houses to be handed over by November 2018.



## KIRKHILL, BROXBURN

Work on Scotland's largest council housing new development site since 2009 continues.

61 units were handed over by December 2017 with a further 17 expected in Spring 2018. This will bring the total number of completions on site to 78. All 230 homes in the development are expected to be completed by Winter 2018.

## **BATHVILLE CROSS, ARMADALE**

Housing Customer and Building Services in partnership with colleagues in the Construction Services Design Team are now close to completing the second phase of the Bathville development.

A strong emphasis has been placed on ensuring modern, well equipped and environmentally sustainable properties.

The refurbishment includes the construction of new balconies and stairs, external wall insulation, patios and fencing. In addition to the refurbishment plans for the existing blocks, three new homes have been built at South Street. These consist of

one bedroom properties, which are wheelchair accessible. Work is scheduled to start on the fourth phase of the development in the coming months.

The partnership established with the council apprenticeship scheme throughout this project has allowed council apprentices to gain valuable skills and experiences while working on this bespoke development.

## **REDHOUSE HANDOVERS**

The site in Blackburn is one of the largest sites within the council's new build housing programme, with 100 houses in total.



The site consists of one and two bedroom cottage flats, two, three, four and five bedroom houses and one, two and three bedroom

wheelchair accessible bungalows. Technical communications issues have delayed progress on the site in recent months, however these

have now been resolved and a total of 53 houses are nearing completion. We anticipate that all houses will be completed by Summer 2018.



## **APPLETON DRIVE**

Tenants recently received the keys to their new council homes at Appleton Drive in Livingston.

The site which is located within the Barratt development in Eliburn offers affordable housing in a prime location. The development in the centre of the town comprises of 10 council homes made up of cottage flats and semi-detached houses.

The modern and spacious homes are amongst the first new build council houses in West Lothian to be fitted with PV solar panels and are designed to have a carbon offset which will help reduce the carbon footprint for this development.

## DRUMSHORELAND

Good progress has been made by McTaggart Construction on the site at Drumshoreland.

A total of 86 cottage flats, houses and wheelchair accessible bungalows for rent are being built on site.

## Universal Credit



## is being introduced in West Lothian in May 2018.

It could mean a time of change and possible uncertainty for people receiving support through welfare benefits.

Universal Credit (UC) is administered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and aims to make the Welfare Benefits system simpler by replacing six key benefits and tax credits with one single monthly lump sum payment.

### **Universal Credit replaces:**

- Housing Benefit\*
- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment Support Allowance

- Child Tax Credits
- Working Tax Credits

### What you need to receive your benefits:

In order to receive Universal Credit you must have in place:

- A bank account
- An email address
- A telephone number

### **Digital Support**

For some people, making an application or managing their UC online may not be something they feel able to do. If you feel that your IT or digital skills are not up to

doing this task yourself, you can get support from an IT Buddy. Call 01506 282923 to get details of where IT buddies are available.

### **Other Support**

West Lothian Council's Adult Learning team can offer a wide range of courses for people that may improve confidence in making and managing a UC claim online, such as;

- English as a second or other language
- Digital courses
- Courses to improve reading, writing and numeracy







### **Your Practice Nurse**

Practice nurses are experienced in dealing with many conditions such as high blood pressure, asthma, diabetes and a range of minor illnesses such as chest, urine and ear infections, as well as skin conditions. Many can prescribe medications and arrange investigations. Ask your GP practice receptionist for advice on whether the nurse might be able to deal with your problem.


