Apprentice on board with helping others

A West Lothian Council Modern Apprentice is set to use his experience to help others with their careers.

Connor Waldron, a Modern Apprentice in HGV vehicle maintenance with Fleet Services, has recently been named on West Lothian's Developing the Young Workforce (DYW) Regional Board.

DYW West Lothian work to connect businesses to education in order to improve the employment position for young people. Connor will be able to call upon his own experience to inform the work of the group.

He first started working with the council in 2014 as part of a Foundation Apprenticeship.

Still attending school, he split his time between working in Fleet Services and learning with West Lothian College.

A Foundation Apprenticeship provides young people with the opportunity to gain work experience and the chance to develop core skills which help them to make a smooth transition into the world of work.

Connor successfully completed his course whilst being named as the Foundation Apprentice of the Year at the 2016 Scottish Apprenticeship Awards and has continued into full employment with West Lothian Council through a Modern Apprenticeship.

Connor said: "I would recommend a Foundation Apprenticeship to anyone whether you know exactly what you want to do or are still unsure. The experience it provided allowed me to get to where I am today and hopefully my story will help other young people decide which path they want to take."

Fleet Services Coordinator, Douglas West said: "It's fantastic to see Connor get such recognition. He acknowledges the hard work that is required on a daily basis and takes information on board. It's a privilege to have him here with us in Fleet Services and I'm sure the DYW group will find his input invaluable."

Options for bridging budget gap

West Lothian Council is set to consider potential options to bridge an estimated budget gap of £6.7 million between 2020/21 and 2022/23.

Council officers have identified a range of potential savings measures which could help the council deliver a balanced budget to meet its legal obligations. Over £31 million of saving measures have already been identified for the next three years, in addition to the £121 million of savings that have already been delivered since 2007.

These measures will be considered by members of the relevant Policy Development Scrutiny Panels (PDSPs) at meetings taking place over the next three months up to the end of 2019. Any feedback from at the PDSPs will be used to inform the council's budget planning, with the Scottish Government confirming their funding allocation to West Lothian in December 2019.

The council's budget for 2020/21, which includes any Council Tax increase, will be set at a meeting of the full West Lothian Council in February 2020.

Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "It's unfortunate that we are still in the position of looking at options to enable us to balance our books

for a 12th consecutive year.

"The funding we receive from the Scottish Government has not been sufficient to cover the costs of providing essential services for our growing population of younger and older people, creating a substantial budget gap. This means we have no choice but to look at options for creating efficiencies, reducing costs and changing services.

"I call on the Scottish Government to provide us with a fair budget settlement for 2020/21 that will prevent the need for further cuts to local services.

"It's important to stress that the potential savings identified by officers are only options at this point, and any decisions on these options will not be made until next year. However, we are required by law to set a balanced budget so alternatives will need to be found if these potential measures are not agreed.

"The lack of funding for local government for the last 12 years means that councillors have a huge responsibility of agreeing where our budget is spent. With over £150 million worth of savings

already delivered or identified since 2007, it is now extremely challenging to find any more that do not have a major impact on local residents and our agreed priorities."

As well as the savings measures, council officers have also been considering other steps to help close the budget gap.

Council tax in West Lothian is the tenth lowest of Scotland's 32 councils, with Band D £533 per year less than the average in England. The current budget model assumes an increase of 3% per year for the next three financial years. The maximum allowable level set by the Scottish Government is currently 4.79% per year, with higher council tax increases a potential option to help close the budget gap.

A review of the council's Loan Fund and Insurance Fund has also identified potential measures, such as re-profiling repayments and reviewing insurance liabilities, that if agreed would allow one-off resources to be re-allocated to priorities such as the council's Modernisation Fund

UK's largest rock ramp opens in West Lothian

The official opening of the 85m by 50m ramp construction at Howden Bridge Weir took place recently, connecting the lower and upper reaches of the River Almond so fish species can travel upstream and enrich the wildlife ecosystem of the river.

Over 9,000 tonnes of rock, much of it recycled from other developments in West Lothian has been crafted to facilitate a fish pass, one of eight capital projects on the River Almond designed to reinvigorate the ecosystems of these rivers to the benefit of the wildlife and communities connected to them.

At Howden Bridge, the weir was originally built to power the New Calder Paper Mill, which produced wrapping paper from the 1800s. Over three months, the ramp was built between existing islands across the face of the weir to form a waterfall-like structure made up of pools, runs and easy leaps to help fish over the weir. This easing solution will help preserve this piece of industrial heritage and taking into account the length of river involved is the largest rock ramp in the UK.

The project was delivered by RiverLife: Almond & Avon is a partnership project between the Forth Rivers Trust, West Lothian Council & City of Edinburgh Council, which is funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, The Scottish Government, SEPA

Water Environment Fund, West Lothian & City of Edinburgh Councils.
 Leader of the Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "The wellbeing of our rivers is not just about the quality of water, but also about the extent to which they support healthy populations of wildlife."
 "I am delighted to formally acknowledge a milestone in the project to assist the migration of salmon and other species up river with completion of a new rock ramp here at Howden Bridge."
 Director of the Forth Rivers Trust Alison Baker added: "The completion of this key work for the improvement of conditions for migratory fish on the River Almond is momentous and the progress made on other projects this year is very exciting."
 "The RiverLife project has only been delivered due to 10 years of hard work by the Trust, SEPA and other organisations including West Lothian Council. The Howden Rock Ramp is an opportunity for the local community to engage with the river which is at the heart of Livingston."

“Completion of the rock ramp at Howden Bridge is another step in a long term project to improve fish migration, wildlife habitats and community engagement along the River Almond.
 “This new route for fish is positive proof of what can be achieved in local rivers by good partnership working and we look forward to the project’s next exciting phase.”

Recycling on the rise - West Lothian among best in Scotland

Local residents are thanked for their efforts that have once again seen West Lothian named as one of the top areas for recycling in the country. West Lothian has been named as the second best council area in Scotland for recycling 65.2% of all waste during 2018, being one of only two Scottish local authorities to achieve a recycling rate of over 60%. This continued the positive trend from last year when it was announced that West Lothian recorded the largest rise in household waste recycling rates in the whole of Scotland for 2017 with local rates increasing again by a further 3.9% in 2018. Executive councillor for the environment Tom Conn said: "Thank you to all the West Lothian residents for their continued participation in our recycling schemes. "Everyone can ensure they are contributing by checking that they are disposing of items correctly by placing them into the



appropriate bin in order to prevent contamination.
 "Recycling more has huge benefits for everyone. These include less damage to the environment and keeping money for essential local services in West Lothian, through sending less material to landfill and reducing the costs of recycling at a time where council budgets continue to be under pressure.
 "There have been many changes to our recycling and waste services in recent years and with further changes, such as bringing food and garden waste together into one brown bin collection earlier this, we'd hope that more people can participate in our recycling services."

Seventh year of improving exam results



Early indications show that the results from S5 pupils across West Lothian's 11 secondary schools have improved across a number of key indicators at Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF) Level 6, which includes Highers or equivalent qualifications.

Those achieving five or more passes at this level rose by nine percentage points this year to 41%, and those with three or more passes rising by six percentage points to 58%.

Executive councillor for education, David Dodds, said: "It's another fantastic set of exam results

for West Lothian, and a just reward for all the hard work from pupils to achieve them.

"I'm delighted to see a record seventh consecutive year of improving exam results, as we aim to do all we can to support our young people to succeed."

Whitburn Academy S5 pupils were among those who performed exceptionally well this year at Higher or equivalent level, with an 11 percentage point increase in those achieving five or more passes and a 12 percentage point increase in those achieving three or more

passes.

Whitburn Academy Headteacher Tracey Loudon said: "I am incredibly proud of the outstanding achievements of so many of our pupils receiving their exam results today.

"I am so pleased that the hard work, commitment and dedication of both staff and pupils is reflected in our brilliant results."

A total of 71% of S5 pupils in West Lothian now achieve one or more Higher or equivalent level qualification, an incredible rise of 17 percentage points since 2014. Those achieving three or more passes at this level have also risen by six percentage points in the last year to 58%, a 24 percentage point rise over the last five years.

The number of S5 pupils achieving five or more Higher or equivalent level passes has more than doubled over the last five years to an impressive 42% in West Lothian.

Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick added: "It's vital we support their achievements by giving them the best possible platform for learning, such as continuing to invest in our school estate to ensure it remains one of the best in Scotland.

"A total of 93.3% of West Lothian pupils went onto sustained positive destinations after leaving school last year, such as education, training or employment, and we hope this will also continue to improve again this year."

New Beatlie School on the way

Plans are progressing for a new specialist school to replace Beatlie School Campus in Livingston.

Beatlie currently provides specialist education for pupils aged 3 to 18 with severe and complex medical needs from their campus in Craigshill.

The proposed new purpose-built facility will be a centre of excellence for children and young people, providing cutting-edge educational facilities alongside partner health and wrap around support for children and families.

The new school is being developed as part of phase one of the Scottish Government's new School Investment Programme.

Executive councillor for education David Dodds said: "I'm delighted that we are moving forward to replace the current Beatlie building with a state-of-the-art facility.

"Detailed plans will be developed to deliver the new cutting-edge facility, which is appropriate for the delivery of high-quality services to our young people with severe and complex medical needs.

"We will engage with the school and local community over the detailed proposals for the new Beatlie School.

"West Lothian already has one of the best school estates in Scotland and this new addition will help ensure our young people have the best possible platform for learning."

New school for East Calder



West Lothian Council has approved plans for a new primary school to be built at Calderwood, East Calder.

The council will spend over £14.5 million on the school and propose to have the school opened by August 2021. Construction is expected to begin in Spring 2020. The new primary will also include a new Early Years nursery school. West Lothian Council is committed to supporting new housing to be delivered through Core Development Areas (CDAs) such as Calderwood, East

Calder. The new school and its additional school capacity will help to support new local housing.

The Council Executive has approved the formal submission of a New Project Request to Hub South East Territory Partnership for the delivery of the new primary school, who will take forward the build project on behalf of the council.

As with all new school projects where there are changes to school catchments, a formal statutory education consultation is undertaken. The council has approved the commencement on formal public consultation to review admission arrangements to establish the catchment area of the school and review the admission arrangements arising from a variation of the

catchment area of East Calder Primary School.

Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "Many of our communities are growing and more and more people are choosing to make West Lothian their home. The council is committed to ensuring that we have sufficient education capacity for our area and that we deliver modern and innovative schools to ensure that our children are provided with the possible environment and opportunities for quality learning and life chances."

Executive councillor for education David Dodds said: "This is a very exciting time in Education within West Lothian. Despite huge financial challenges that the council faces we are choosing to focus on resources that matter most to our communities, and we are investing heavily in our school buildings and education resources. We are delighted at the progress being made on this large-scale project."

and all should be very proud. "We would also like to thank everyone involved in running the event and a special thank you to the pupils and staff of West Calder High School for being such magnificent hosts. "They all helped to make the Stellar Awards a very special afternoon for our pupils and students."

Summer schools programme of works

Over £5 million of improvement work to West Lothian schools took place over the summer holiday period.

The council used the extended break for school pupils to carry out essential works on the school estate across the whole of West Lothian. Some projects were large, some small, but they all contribute to improving the school estate for pupils. Executive councillor for education David Dodds said: "Continuing to improve settings across our education facilities will provide the best possible environment for students to learn. I hope pupils, staff and local communities will come to enjoy the upgrades and new facilities."

The programme - which comprised of over 150 individual projects - involved work to support the expansion of Early Learning and Childcare from August 2019, and included refurbishment and extension work at the Polkemmet Primary School nursery (Whitburn), refurbishment work at Carmondean, Deans (both Livingston), Dechmont, Bridgend and St Nicholas (Broxburn) primary schools and the installation of new kitchens at Simpson (Bathgate) and St John the Baptist (Fauldhouse) primary school.

Work took place at schools across the county including: significant investment in refurbishment and internal works at Ogilvie School Campus (Livingston); toilet refurbishments at Our Lady's Primary School (Stoneyburn), Williamston Primary School (Livingston) and Springfield Primary School (Linlithgow); roof replacement works at St Ninian's Primary School (Livingston) and St Nicholas Primary School (Broxburn); and phase four of the science lab refurbishment at Linlithgow Academy.





West Lothian Council plans to have 30,000 tonnes of salt available for the winter period. This represents three times the amount that is needed for a 'normal' winter. In addition, we have pre-arranged contracts with suppliers if we need them in periods of prolonged snowfall. It is not possible for support to be provided everywhere at the same time. TRUE GRIT

West Lothian's fleet of gritters and their dedicated drivers are ready to make every effort to keep everyone moving during severe weather.

The council's fleet of 96 vehicles available for winter work includes eight dedicated fixed body gritters, which were named by local school children last winter. The names chosen were: Sir Chilly Connolly; Han Snowlo; Elvis Spreadly; West Snowthian; Alba Gritting Ye; Meltin John; Obi Wan Gritobi; and Salt-tyre.

An extreme weather event will be considered to be an event where continuous snow is forecast and likely to give significant accumulations in excess of 10cm covering the whole of the north or south expanse within the council area. The snow will also be expected to remain in untreated areas for a prolonged period due to low temperatures before a natural thaw disperses it.

During periods of extreme weather, treatment may be limited to primary carriageway routes and primary footpath routes or 'snow routes'.

Gritters and footpath resources will be deployed on these specified 'snow routes' continuously until satisfactory snow clearance has been achieved before resources are deployed to any secondary routes, to maintain access to key facilities and other transport needs.

Grit bins



There are over **2,500** grit bins across West Lothian

Grit bin policy

In times of an extreme weather event it is not always possible to service and replenish grit bins due to their location and the deployment of resources in higher priority areas.

In the event that the grit bin service is suspended, the council will provide temporary grit bags and grit heaps at locations across the area for use by the public. The locations will be advertised on the council's website and social media pages.

Many shops also sell salt/grit for domestic use.

Primary routes (snow routes)

These are important principal roads, major scheduled bus routes, routes to fire stations, hospitals, ambulance depots and local danger spots on roads and major industrial estates.

Actions

Gritting and/or snow ploughing 24 hours a day on all days. Pre-grit if required - in advance or if snow falls.

Secondary road routes - Level 1

Other classified routes, distributor routes and connecting routes between centres, minor bus routes, main accesses to schools, medical centres and residential areas.

Actions

Gritting and/or snow ploughing during normal working hours from 8am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. Pre-grit if resources allow.

Secondary road routes - Level 2

Residential areas, culs-de-sac and other unclassified roads.

Actions

Gritting and/or snow ploughing during normal working hours 8am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. Reactive treatment only.

Secondary road routes - Level 3

Surfaced areas within schools, roads within industrial estates, routes to car parks and car park surfaces.

Actions

Gritting and/or snow ploughing during normal working hours 8am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. Reactive treatment only.

Primary footpath (snow routes)

Urban shopping areas and precincts. Routes to schools, accesses to health centres and medical centres, hospitals, main routes to residential areas and bus stops.

Actions

During November and March, gritting of widespread ice/snow clearing takes place from 5am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. During December, January and February the service will be extended to cover weekends and public holidays (5am to 3.05pm). Reactive treatment only.

Secondary footpath routes - Level 1

Other routes to schools, residential areas and housing areas in general.

Actions

Gritting/snow clearing from 8am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. Reactive treatment only.

Secondary footpath routes - Level 2

Footway links to car parks, community centres, day centres etc and cycle routes.

Actions

Gritting/snow clearing from 8am to 3.05pm, Monday to Friday. Reactive treatment only.

Salt conservation

In periods of extreme weather, it may be necessary to restrict the use of salt to 'snow routes' only. West Lothian Council reaches a minimum stock level when there is only enough salt for six continuous days.

Please note: Salt is less effective at minus six degrees and has minimal impact on ice and snow below minus 10 degrees.

Heavy rain following a treatment of salt can wash the salt from the road meaning we often need to return to the beginning of the priority cycle before many secondary routes are reached. Unfortunately this familiar pattern can prevent any significant progress through the various priority levels.

Schools

Safety is a top priority for West Lothian Council and the decision to close a school or nursery to pupils is one which is not made lightly.

The Head Teacher has responsibility for undertaking a risk assessment in the event of severe weather or building difficulties. There are several factors which may impact on this decision, which is made in consultation with an education manager.

West Lothian Council will provide as much notice as possible of any school closure so that you can make alternative arrangements for your children. We will contact you via Group Call, provide information to local radio stations, and update the council's website and social media channels. Many schools can also contact parents/carers by email.

Travelling to school

In extreme weather conditions, parents/carers should assess whether they consider it safe for their child to travel or walk to school, and

alert the school of their decision at the earliest possible opportunity.

Please check that your child knows how to access the online education community GLOW, where pupils can access educational material online.

Severe weather volunteer service

The service to help vulnerable members of the community is ready to be activated should this winter prove to be challenging.

If this happens information will be shared via the local media, the council's website, social media channels and the email information service.

Waste collections

During the winter, please continue to present your bin as usual. Please ensure snow has been removed from the lid. The council will only suspend the household waste collection service in extreme situations. For example, where there is widespread heavy snow which makes it impossible for the bin lorries to enter residential areas.

If the service is suspended, updates will be provided via local press and the council's website and social media channels.

Winter colds and prescriptions

Please ensure your medicine cabinet is sufficiently stocked with over-the-counter remedies so that if you become unwell you are prepared.

GP Surgeries will be closed at times over Christmas and New Year.

Prepare by ordering medication to cover both Christmas and New Year holiday breaks.

Don't give COLD a chance

Protect yourself and your home



Inside your home:

Frozen Pipes:

- turn off the water supply (make sure you know where this is).
- turn off the stopcock in your cold water tank, if you have one.
- protect everything around the frozen pipe to avoid damage; if it bursts, place buckets, basins and towels around the area.

Thawing Out:

- open the tap nearest to the part of the pipe you think is frozen, so the water can flow through when it has melted.
- thaw the ice in the pipe with a hot water bottle or hairdryer (taking care to keep it well away from any water). Start from the tap end and work back toward the cold water tank.

NEVER use a heat gun or blowtorch – the pipe needs to be thawed out slowly and safely!

Try the following care tips:

- if your tank is in the loft, open the loft trap door on very cold days to let heat in.
- if you're going on holiday and your home will be empty drain down the water system. If you are a council tenant contact your local housing office who can arrange for this to be done.
- in very cold weather, if you're going out for the day, or perhaps away for a couple of days over the Christmas period, keep your heating on, or set it to come on a couple of times a day.

Following this advice should minimise the risk of having a frozen or burst pipe. However, if you are a council tenant and this happens, please report it immediately to our Customer Service Centre on 01506 280000.

Outside your home:

In very severe cold spells, care should be taken outside your property due to the formation of icicles, which can become dangerous when they grow large, especially if they have a long distance to fall.

what you shouldn't do

Don't try to knock large icicles off the gutters. Hitting icicles could cause more pressure on the guttering which in turn could cause them to collapse. Large icicles in particular are unpredictable when they fall and could cause injury or property damage.

The best thing to do

leave them alone and monitor them. If necessary cordon off or block the area where the icicles are hanging to prevent and deter anyone from walking directly below them.

How can you help?

- Consider the steps you can take to protect your home and business.
- Living with severe weather is frustrating – please be patient with council staff who are trying to work in challenging situations.
- Consider volunteering.
- Keep an eye on your neighbours and

share information.

- Make sure that your child's school has up-to-date contact details for you.
- Follow the council's social media channels for updates.

Clearing snow:

There is no law preventing members of the public and businesses from clearing the

snow and ice from public roads and footways outside their property. However, please take care when attempting to undertake any snow clearing so you don't create any further hazards.

Park sensibly:

Abandoned cars hamper access for snowploughs and diggers, emergency

vehicles, bin lorries and other road users.

Travel:

Check your travel arrangements before starting out and leave extra time for your journey.

Prepare your car for winter now.

Challenge Poverty Week

A number of events were held throughout West Lothian to mark Challenge Poverty Week.

The Week is a national campaign designed to show that poverty exists in Scotland and affects us all, that people can work to end it, that it restricts people's ability to take part in society and that it can be solved by boosting incomes and reducing costs of living.

Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick visited Croftmalloch Primary School in Whitburn to hear about their work being undertaken to tackle poverty.

Acting Head teacher Laura Baillie and P5 pupils spoke about some of the work taking place to tackle poverty and reduce the cost of the school day for families on a daily basis. This includes: work to reduce the cost of uniforms, breakfast clubs, subsidised school trips and a food and welly boot bank.

The average level of child poverty in West Lothian is 22% which is comparable to the Scottish level. This means that 8,551 children in West Lothian live in relative poverty after housing costs are taken into account. The national Child Poverty Act set out that by 2023 less than 18% of children

should be living in relative poverty. Whilst the West Lothian average is 22% this figure is higher in some areas of West Lothian (i.e. Whitburn & Blackburn is 32%).

West Lothian Council is developing a Local Action Report to tackle child poverty.

“Too many people are trapped in the grips of poverty and don't have the means to escape. Challenge Poverty Week gives us an opportunity to highlight that there is help and support available and the chance to talk about what we can all do to address this growing issue. Hopefully our events will mean that individuals who are suffering the effects of poverty can get the appropriate support and advice to help unlock their full potential. It was lovely to meet the pupils and staff at Croftmalloch Primary and hear about the wonderful work that they undertake to help people.”

Affordable Credit project shortlisted for award

The CDFI service in West Lothian is delivered by Conduit Scotland, who support families and communities by offering lower cost, affordable loans as an alternative to high cost credit lenders regardless of credit history. Conduit Scotland works closely with local services to signpost customers for further help, support and advice in the community.

Benefits team is fastest in Scotland for processing claims

West Lothian Council's Benefits Team is officially the quickest in Scotland at processing housing benefit claims.

Figures from the Department of Work and Pensions show that it processed claims within 13 days against an average across Scotland of 20 days.

The council's benefits team is the highest performing team in Scotland and is part of the council's Anti-Poverty Service, which is working with a range of partners to support those who are experiencing the impact of poverty.

West Lothian Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "It is important households who are applying for a benefit get a decision and it is processed as quickly as possible to reduce any financial burden they may be facing.

"The Benefits Team work tirelessly to ensure that applications are dealt with in a timely and efficient manner to minimise stress for applicants, limiting the potential for them to fall into rent arrears.

"They must be congratulated for the service they are providing for the people of West Lothian and encouraged to continue the excellent work."

Changes to food and garden waste collection reminder

West Lothian householders are being reminded that food waste should now be placed into brown bins along with their garden waste.

It is important that householders do not put plastic bags into their brown bins, with food in compostable bags, or simply placed in the brown bin loose.

This is because the national limits for the amounts of plastics allowed in compost have reduced and are reducing further. Each council has to meet the limits for plastics that are stated in SEPA's regulations and guidance.

The council has a new contract which allows garden and food waste to be disposed of together which should help increase the amount of food waste recycled in West Lothian.

There are a number of benefits to 'co-mingling' food and garden waste, including:

- It's easier and more straightforward for customers to recycle, which should help to increase the amount of food waste being recycled
- Brown bins will be emptied fortnightly all year round
- There will be fewer bins for residents to manage/store

Collecting food and garden waste together already takes place in a number of other Scottish council areas including Aberdeen City, East Renfrewshire, Fife, Glasgow City, Moray, North Ayrshire, North Lanarkshire and Perth & Kinross.

Festive recycling and waste collection changes

Householders are advised to make sure they find out when their bins will be collected over the festive period.



Check www.westlothian.gov.uk/festivebins in December 2019 for details of recycling and waste arrangements over the Christmas and New Year period.

The holiday period means collections could be liable to change from Monday 16 December onwards. Collections times could also differ from usual, so residents are also reminded that bins should be put out by 7am on the morning of collection and kept out until they are emptied.

Changes will be advertised on the council website at www.westlothian.gov.uk/festivebins in December as well as on the council's social media

channels and in the local press. Householders can use our on line service, which allows you to check bin collection days and subscribe to E-mail reminders to find out about planned changes to your bin collection days over the festive period, or set a reminder, such as marking a calendar, to make sure they don't miss any collections. Note that unlike email reminders, when you download PDFs or ICALENDARs the collection dates are fixed and will not

update when there are day changes.

Recycling and refuse can also be taken to West Lothian's five Recycling Centres at Blackburn, Broxburn, Linlithgow, Oakbank in Livingston and Whitburn.

Protecting West Lothian's trees

A number of trees and woodlands across West Lothian are protected through legislation.



Local residents are reminded to check the status of any trees on their land before carrying out works such as felling and pruning. Any tree works carried out on protected trees without the appropriate permission will be subject to investigation, enforcement and potential prosecution.

Trees and woodlands are important features for landscape character in West Lothian, as well as for townscapes of historic, existing and emerging settlements, providing environmental value and amenity to residents, businesses and visitors.

In West Lothian, there are over 80 tree preservation orders (TPOs) in force, with fines of up to £20,000 for anyone found guilty of damaging a tree without permission. For more details of TPOs, please visit www.westlothian.gov.uk/tree-works or email DPgeneral@westlothian.gov.uk.

West Lothian's nine conservation areas also provide protection for trees, and prior approval must be sought in writing from the council as planning authority for any work to trees. For more information, please visit www.westlothian.gov.uk/conservation-areas or email DPgeneral@westlothian.gov.uk.

When granting planning consent, planning conditions may be applied in order to retain existing trees. Planning

conditions may also be applied which require new tree planting to be provided.

In advance of carrying out tree works you can check if a tree is affected by planning conditions by emailing details to planning@westlothian.gov.uk

Anyone looking to fell more than five medium trees on their land in a year should seek permission from Scottish Forestry (previously Forestry Commission) before proceeding. More info at www.forestry.gov.scot

Trees and woodlands provide habitat for birds, bats, badgers and other species many of which are protected by legislation. Please note that it is an offence to disturb any birds during the breeding season. It is also an offence to capture, injure, kill, harass or disturb bats or to damage or destroy breeding sites and resting places

Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs) are important sites designated to protect nationally significant habitats. There are currently 15 sites in West Lothian.

Certain operations which could damage the natural features of a SSSI would require the consent of SNH.

Investment in three rural bridges

West Lothian Council is investing £50,000 to repair three rural bridges.



Essential repair work is planned on: Balderston Bridge, north of Linlithgow Bridge; Plantation Bridge, east of Winchburgh; and Woodend Bridge, north of Armadale.

Routine inspections of all three bridges identified essential repairs that were required to ensure the long-term durability of the structures, with a modern safety barrier also to be installed at Woodend Bridge. All three projects will involve

road closures for a maximum of four weeks to allow them to be safely completed. It is hoped that the projects can be completed within a shorter

timescales if conditions allow, with Chemcem (Scotland) Ltd carrying out the work on behalf of the council.

“It's essential we continue to invest in our road network and I'm delighted to see the £50,000 investment ensuring these rural bridges can be used for many years to come.

“We would like to thank road users for their patience while these works are completed. In all three cases, the restricted road width means a road closure is required to ensure the safety of road users and the workers carrying out the repairs.”

New build housing site at Drumshoreland completed

West Lothian Council tenants have started to move into brand new, council homes at Drumshoreland Road, Pumpherston.

McTaggart Construction have built 86 properties on the site, consisting of a mixture of cottage flats, houses and amenity bungalows designed in accordance with Housing for Varying Needs.

The development exists near local amenities and there are a range of house types including bungalows, cottage flats, terraced and semi-detached homes.

Executive councillor for services for the community, George Paul visited the site with West Lothian Council Community Based Housing Officer, Alison Laing to meet tenant, Mrs Elaine Urquhart who has moved into a bungalow on the site.

Councillor Paul said: "It's pleasing

that the site at Drumshoreland is now complete and it was a pleasure to meet Mrs Urquhart and to hear that her family are enjoying their new home. I wish them many years of happiness living here.

"West Lothian Council is one of Scotland's top councils in terms of building new council homes with the council delivering over 1,200 homes since the beginning of 2012.

"There is a need to continue to increase the number of affordable homes across West Lothian and a significant amount of investment will continue to go towards a target of delivering 3,000 affordable homes in West Lothian over the 10 year period to 2022."

West Lothian Strategic Housing Investment Plan Update

Plans for further opportunities for social housing have been revealed.

A meeting of West Lothian Council Services for the Community Policy Development Scrutiny Panel (PDSP) heard details on the updated West Lothian Strategic Housing Investment Plan (SHIP).

The Scottish Government has requested that all Local Authorities submit a five year Strategic Housing Investment Plan (SHIP) which will augment their current Local Housing Strategies.

The major objective of the SHIP is for Local Authorities, in conjunction with Registered Social Landlords (RSLs), to ascertain the viability of current and future social housing investment opportunities.

The PDSP heard that RSL partners have identified a number of development opportunities and the council also has an ambitious programme of new build council housing which aims to see a total of 3000 new homes for rent delivered

from 2012-2022.

West Lothian Development Alliance (WLDA), Places for People/ Castle Rock Edinvar, the Wheatley Group (West Lothian Housing Partnership and Dunedin Canmore Housing Association), Cairn Housing Association, Home Group and Ark Housing Association have all identified potential sites.

Meanwhile West Lothian Council has approved development for 168 affordable homes across the area as part of its own new build programme which will aim to deliver 250 new homes in the next phase.

Council sites will include: Vion, Broxburn; Standhill, Bathgate; Brucefield, Livingston; Mossend, West Calder, and Eagle Brae, Livingston.

Further sites for up to 82 properties have been identified in Bathgate and a site for specialist housing provision at Cawburn Road has also been included for people with complex


needs.

The SHIP will now go to West Lothian Council Executive for further consideration.

Executive councillor for services for the Community George Paul said: "West Lothian has one of the most ambitious targets for delivering social housing in the country.

The Strategic Housing Investment Plan presents an opportunity to set out key investment priorities for affordable housing and demonstrate how these will be delivered. This also enables the council and RSL partners to develop a more strategic approach to the development of sites in West Lothian."

The local campaign shared information on the importance of Black History Month, the various events being held across Scotland and highlighted local information in relation to our BME


communities and events from the past and present.

On-board with bus changes

Operating hours for some town centre bus routes changed from Monday 30 September.



The Linlithgow Town Service (1), Bathgate Town Service (5), Armadale Town Service (6) are fully subsidised by West Lothian Council. They previously operated Monday to Friday until 6pm.

Additional time limited funding, which extended the town centre bus routes from 3pm until 6pm, has now expired meaning that the services will operate fewer hours. Each service now operates until 3pm Monday to Friday and until 12pm on a Saturday. Whilst each town centre is serviced by other bus operators and alternative buses are available, residential areas will be affected.

In other bus news, the council has approved a funding package worth nearly £400,000 per year to ensure that the 31 bus service continues.

The 31 service is an important service locally as it provides the only direct link from the Bathgate and Livingston areas to Torphichen, Philpstown and Linlithgow. The 31 service is the only bus service available in both Torphichen and Philpstown.

The 31 service is fully subsidised by West Lothian Council. The council's subsidy did provide additional stops in Ladywell and Dechmont. However, time-limited funding (as mentioned above) for the additional stops has now expired, meaning that the 31 service will no longer serve either Ladywell and Dechmont.

The 31 service is now operated by ?? after E&M Horsburgh handed back their contract for the service.

The 31 service is operated over two separate subsidized contracts. One for an hourly service Monday - Saturday and one for a 2 hourly service on a Sunday. The Sunday service is contracted with E&M Horsburgh and has not been cancelled and will continue to be operated by E&M Horsburgh. It is recognized that in order to maintain consistency for passengers across the two contracts any changes made to the Monday- Saturday service should be replicated in the Sunday service. All other parts of the route will remain the same.

Art links growing Winchburgh to village history

Two art projects linked to the fascinating history of the rapidly expanding community of Winchburgh have been launched.

A joint launch event was held recently to mark the completion of both the 'It's a Bing Thing' public art installation and the 'Kitchen Conversations' oral history and creative writing project.

The public art work was a joint project from West Lothian Council and Winchburgh Developments Ltd, while Winchburgh Community Development Trust managed the Kitchen Conversations project with funding support from the National Lottery's Awards for All grants.

'It's a Bing Thing' public art installation is a playful sculpture that doubles as a seating area for the new civic square. It was inspired by the landscape of Bings around Winchburgh and the disappearing Niddry Castle

Bing and includes a poem inscribed around the edges of each tier of the artwork by Scottish poet William Letford.

It was designed and created by architects and artists team Dallas Pierce Quintero as the first step in an overall strategy for public art in the area.

Executive councillor for culture and leisure Dave King said: "It's great to see another fascinating piece of public art for West Lothian.

"Winchburgh is a growing community thanks to a landmark deal involving the council that will deliver massive investment in new schools, new homes and vital infrastructure to transform the village.

"Developers are required to make a contribution to public art in the area, which pays for



art works such as this. The combined sculpture and practical seating area should improve both the look and amenity of the Winchburgh's civic square for the whole community."

The 'Kitchen Conversations' project offered women living in Winchburgh the chance to come together and share life stories which they crafted together to create an original publication.

The women come from a range of backgrounds, cultures, ages and experiences, all interested in making Winchburgh a great place to live for current and future generations.

Pupils from Toronto Primary in Livingston were the face of the Bikeability Scotland programme, which was seen a record increase in schools offering free cycle training for pupils.

The percentage of Scotland's primary schools offering on-road cycle training has increased from 42% to 47% in 2018-2019). Cycling Scotland are urging the remaining 53% are urged to follow their path and take advantage of free cycling training for pupils.

Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "We were delighted to welcome Cycling Scotland to

Toronto Primary in Livingston, and showcase the good work taking place in the school to encourage safe cycling, which is an important life skill."

Mrs Black, Acting Principal Teacher, Toronto Primary School said: "It's been great having the Bikeability Scotland team support our delivery of this training for our pupils. It was such an easy process and the children have loved it.

"We would love to offer this each year going forward, so all our primary sixes are equipped with the right knowledge and confidence to be safer cyclists."

Bikeability Scotland is the national cycle training programme for school children, which is delivered in tandem with local authorities. It is funded by national cycling charity Cycling Scotland, through grant funding by Transport Scotland.

The programme is free for schools and pupils, and surveys found that 65% of children were more confident cycling after

Bikeability training and 82% of parents were more in favour of letting their children cycle as a result.

"Cycling Scotland provides funding to support delivery of Bikeability Scotland training to all primary children aged 7-11yrs. "We've done all we can to make the process of accessing the free training for instructors and grant funding as easy as possible. All materials - including pupil's guides, certificates, badges and information for parents - are provided, even bikes can be supplied for the training period. "


